1.	Welcome Garry Smith (GS) on behalf of SuRF ANZ chaired and welcomed everyone. The attendees confirmed they were happy with the agenda. GS provided a short introduction on the purpose of the SURF meetings being for cross country connections and for the promotion of international collaboration on sustainable remediation.	
2.	Introductions	
	Everyone present gave a quick update on the different SuRF Groups and Partners current initiatives and work that they were undertaking in relation to sustainability.	
	<b>SuRF-ANZ</b> Garry Smith (GS) provided an update on SuRF-ANZ. He confirmed their membership continues to grow and be administered through ALGA as a special interest group. They are currently working on the organisation of ECOFORUM where SuRF-ANZ will be hosting a workshop on sustainable remediation. There will be regulators and practitioners attending and Jonathan Smith will be providing a key note address. SuRF-ANZ are now working with regulators to try and get sustainable remediation as a consideration into the National Remediation Framework.	
	<b>SuRF-UK</b> Jonathan Smith (JS) provided an update on SuRF-UK. He explained that the paper for Science of the Total Environment (STOTEN) special publication focussing on the work of SuRF-UK and the Phase 3 deliverables has now been published. It has been published as open access and is available on the SuRF-UK website:

	JS also confirmed that Paul Bardos has been co-ordinating a Special Issue publication on Sustainable Remediation through the Journal of Environmental Management and he understands this is now nearing completion.	
	SuRF-UK continues to respond to public consultations that relate to sustainability aspects however it is not currently high on the UK government agenda.	
	SuRF-UK are looking at dissemination activities to continue to get practitioners to embed sustainability principles into their work.	
	<b>SURF-Taiwan</b> Erica Chiang (EC) gave an update of SuRF Taiwan's activities. She explained that they are currently working on three new case studies and developing a tool kit for best management practices.	
	<b>SuRF-ITALY</b> Claudio Albano (CA) provided an update on behalf of SuRF-Italy. He confirmed that they are still working on finalising the technical framework to address the regulators comments. CA has been presenting on Masters and Foundation courses about sustainable remediation. SuRF-	

Italy and also supporting Remtech in Ferrara.

CA also shared a new European funded project that he is involved in called "ReSite" that that is being led by University of Venice. ReSites seeks to improve the environmental management of un- or underused industrial areas. The project aims to achieve this through the definition of strategies and tools that are based on a sustainable, integrated approach to make functional urban areas (FUAs) cleaner, healthier and more liveable places.

### SuRF-NL

Hans Slenders (HS) provided an update on behalf of SuRF – NL. He confirmed that SuRF-NL has had a quiet year; however there is now a new programme that has been set up in the Netherlands called the National Soil Forum which SuRF-NL will be supported through. This forum will allow activities and workshops to be organized. The first of which will be later in the year.

### NICOLE

The working group continues to function but the frequency of meetings has now decreased to once a year. NICOLE Sustainable Remediation Working Group will remain to be active at events and conferences to promote the uptake of sustainable remediation. NICOLE discussed the support of ISRA and it was agreed that NICOLE would like to be associated.

#### SuRF-JAPAN

Yasuhide Furukawa (YF) provided an update on the activities in Japan. YF confirmed that the sustainable remediation consortium held their first general assembly and a conference on June 7<sup>th</sup> 2016, for which about 50 people attended. Eleven corporate members and seven individual members are now registered within the consortium. The consortium members have now agreed to act as SuRF-Japan and will start to formalise the registration process. They have also agreed to set up two working groups, one on green remediation and one on sustainable remediation.

The National Institute of Advanced Industrial Science and Technology (AIST) would manage the sustainable remediation consortium and the chairperson would be Dr Yasutata from AIST. AIST is one of the largest public research organizations in Japan, focusing on the creation and practical realization of technologies useful to Japanese industry and society, and on "bridging" the gap between innovative technological seeds and commercialization.

#### SuRF-US

Barbara Maco (BM) provided an update on SuRF-US activities. She confirmed that SuRF-US is continuing to reach out to more members in their 10<sup>th</sup> year. They had recently hosted their 32nd meeting by webinar on social dimensions and their 33<sup>rd</sup> meeting will be in October 2016.

BM confirmed that their new initiative will be "Climate Change Resilience". She welcomed people's view on the outline scope of the paper (which is discussed as a separate item). BM confirmed that a white paper and case studies are the planned outputs. The team working on this project comes from both the public and private sectors.

Building on the Montreal SustRem, SuRF Canada and SURF US are collaborating on the Social Dimensions Technical Initiative Phase II that will include developing a stakeholder roadmap and a case study template. We welcome ISRA members' participation on both the Social Dimension and Climate Change and Resilience Initiatives.
